Chiles Rellenos Casserole – Elizabeth DiPietro

4 (7oz) cans whole green chiles (Ortega type) or 1lg. (27 oz) can Anaheim chiles
1 lb Jack cheese, grated
1 lb mild Cheddar cheese, grated
3 eggs beaten
3Tbsp flour
1 small can evaporated milk
1 (15 oz) can tomato sauce
Wash chiles, open, remove seeds, lay flat & pat dry on paper towels.
In a 13x9 inch ungreased baking dish, layer half the chiles, then half the cheese. Repeat the layer but save approx. 1 ½ cups cheese for topping. Beat the eggs, add flour and milk until blended. Drizzle the egg mixture over the chiles and cheese. (The casserole can be refrigerated at this point, if desired.) Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Spread tomato sauce evenly over the top; sprinkle with the reserved cheese and bake 15 min longer. Cut into squares to serve. Makes 10-15 servings.
Optional: You may add avocado slices, flaked, cooked chicken, etc. to the first layer. Sometimes I add small/medium black olives after the first baking for perhaps a more attractive serving dish. Garnish with fresh cilantro or parsley if desired.

PUBLIC POLICY

Throughout our history, AAUW has advocated for equitable funding of public education as the foundation of a democratic society. Although California is a state rich in resources, human talent, and industries, our elementary and secondary schools have been financially challenged for many years. In a nationwide survey the Public Policy Institute of California found that adjusting for costs, California's per pupil spending ranks near the bottom and California's pupil-teacher ratios are among the highest in the nation. Already Governor Brown has indicated further cuts to Education are likely in his 2011 budget.

As an AAUW member, what can you do?

- Become informed. There are a number of non-partisan sources of information about education policy in California, www.edsource.org, www.ppic.org, www.cbp.org, www.lao.ca.gov to name a few.
- Encourage your branch members to form a Study Group about California education using the research such as California 2025, a PPIC multidisciplinary, multi-year research project. Develop recommendations.
- Attend the March 18, 2011 EdSource Forum in Irvine: The Future of Public Education in California and report back to your branch and your Inter-Branch Council (IBC).
- Write "factoid" articles for your branch newsletter throughout the year explaining what underfunding education means to the future of California. Write letters to the editor or an op-ed article for your paper.
- Visit elected state representatives to discuss the recommendations of your Study Group. Let your congressional representatives know your position regarding federal assistance to education in California.
- Forward your recommendations to AAUW CA Public Policy Committee; request that they be reviewed, shared with other branches and communicated to elected officials in Sacramento.
